LRA (Literary Response & Analysis) Format



- 1. Start with MLA header and heading. Write out the question.
- Skip a line before you start your answer.
- 2. 3. Start with TAG (title, author, genre) and restate the key words from the question in your answer.
- 4. Each answer must contain **text evidence** from the story. Find a sentence or portion of a sentence from the story that supports your answer.
- 5. Use "quotation marks" for direct quotations and a (parenthetical citation) to cite the source of your quotes. (see sample below)
- Always introduce and explain your quote. Never end your answer with a quote from the book. 6. Conclude with your own words. (see sample and chart of Academic Vocabulary)
- 7. Be sure to answer all parts of the question.
- 8. DON'T FORGET: Include a Work Cited at the end of your paper.

Direct Quotation: *note introduction of quote and punctuation The narrator describes the video as, "a poignant piece of social commentary, a testament to the massive rift between our dreams and the often compromised reality in which we live" $(ext{Keret } 4)$.

Parenthetical Citation: *note explanation of quote after the citation

The narrator describes the video as, "a poignant piece of social commentary, a testament to the massive rift between our dreams and the often compromised reality in which we live" (Keret 4). He wants to reveal the difference between what people think and want and the way they actually live.

DO NOT use 1st person POV (I think) or 2nd person POV (You, Your) Use present tense verbs when discussing the text.
